

Introduction

In 1961, I gave my life to the Lord Jesus Christ and was born again after hearing a message called "The Loss of the Soul" preached by a man named Norman Walker. He was a lay preacher and was booked to speak for one Sunday evening in an Assemblies of God church in Coventry where I lived and still do.

A few years after becoming a Christian, I felt the urge to be a preacher of the Word of God and Norman Walker encouraged me in that. "Prepare a message and pray that God will use it" he told me. I took his advice and it was not long afterwards that I had a preaching opportunity at a young people's meeting in a town not far from Coventry. In the years following I received invitations from many churches to speak at their meetings and, after being in the Christian faith for over forty years, I have never grown tired of sharing God's word.

The messages themselves have invariably been the result of time spent in the Word of God and I hope that what is shared as a result represents, in some small way at least, what the Holy Spirit wants His people to hear. It is almost impossible to recall all reference sources I have used when preparing so many messages over so many years. I have a good library of books by numerous authors to which I readily refer, notes from conferences, videos, tapes and a large number of reference materials available via Bible software and the internet. Acknowledgements appear from time to time in my notes but where material has been included from memory it may not have been possible for me remember the source of it.

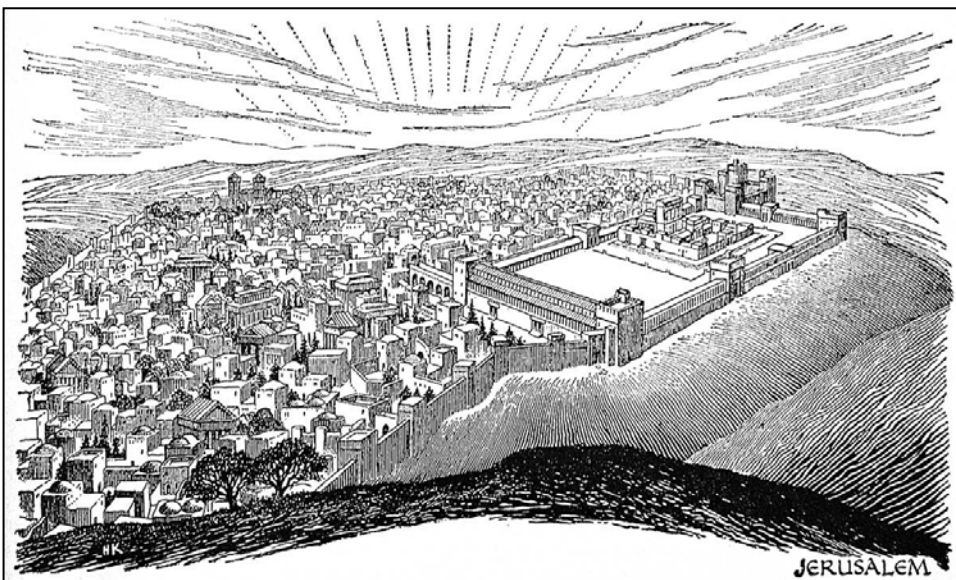
